The Ama Foundation funds Ama Ghar, a permanent care home in Nepal for at-risk homeless children who have been abandoned, trafficked or have lost their home and family to poverty, drug/alcohol abuse or illness. We are dedicated to providing these children with a loving home, an excellent education, health care and the confidence to become productive, self-supporting adults.

First and foremost, we'd like to express our profound gratitude for the support you have shown our mission and our children over our first 20 years. With your help, we have built Ama Ghar from a rented home with 38 children to our own home that can shelter 75 children; from a small and struggling nonprofit to a successful one; from a family of tiny children to a family of 82 children and young adults, 41 of whom have finished the program and are leading successful lives. None of that would have been possible without you.

In 2021, Ama Ghar had to deal with multiple lockdowns, home schooling and lots of tough transitions for our alumni, who had to survive independent living in a Covid economy. Everyone pulled together as a team and we're proud to report that we have come out of that tough situation stronger than ever.

Now we're focused on the future. We have already taken in four new children this year, and we will continue to build our family. Our hope is to improve our fundraising programs so that we can provide a loving home, nutritious meals, good health care and an excellent education to even more at-risk kids. Toward that goal, we are starting at both ends of the spectrum, with a Kids Helping Kids program (every little bit helps!) and a Legacy Giving program to provide long-term sustainable funding. We will continue to keep you posted about how those programs can benefit Ama Ghar and you. Thank you for being such an important part of our family.

As I read studies about the psychological stresses of children in lockdown, I realized that the Ama Ghar children fared much better than many. As part of a large and loving family, they kept each other engaged and vibrant. Seven young adults completed the Ama Ghar program in 2021 (a record). It was tough to go out on their own during this COVID year, so we are especially proud to say that they have found jobs and are starting a new life. Preparing for their futures has been made possible by your continued support throughout their childhood.

Revenue Sources

In the U.S. in 2021, individuals, corporations, foundations and corporate matching programs made up AF's donor base. In total, they made 519 donations to the AF children's fund. Individuals made up 76% of AF's total U.S. contributions. Foundations, corporations and their employer matching programs made up 24 % of total U.S. contributions.


Average Individual U.S. Donation - \$372
